MINOR IN DEAF STUDIES

Curriculum

Students must complete a minimum of six credits of advanced standing coursework in their minor.*

The Minor in Deaf Studies is designed to enable students to understand and have greater awareness of, understanding of, and expertise in the Deaf community, their culture and language. Practical application of language use, cultural appreciation and understanding of deafness from a diversity viewpoint are stressed through three unique minor focus areas, each related to an integral aspect of the Deaf community. The minor prepares students from various majors to more greatly understand the population in which they provide services (Diversity focus area), the culture in which the Deaf individual is a member (Culture focus area), and develop proficiency in the cultural language of American Sign Language (Language focus area). The Deaf Studies Minor is open to any WCU student with an interest in the area.
